Success Story of Ayesha Imalka Gamage

Ayesha Imalka Gamage is a successful entrepreneur from Sri Lanka who won number of awards for her success in doing business. Ayesha is into the business of making Sri Lankan authentic sweets and selling them to the world through a website named "kavumkokis.com". Being a graduate in Civil Engineering, Imalka learnt e-marketing and e-business and had the idea of applying this knowledge in her business. She was inspired by the knowledge she possessed on how well she could use social media such as Facebook, Twitter, and Blogs. in reaching the customers and driving her business to success.

Imalka believes in the beauty of novelty and always wants to do things in a unique way. She identified a market gap which could be exploited as a business opportunity. Accordingly, she identified that the modern housewives do not have time to cook sweetmeats amidst their busy schedules, especially during the festive season. Further, she also noticed that the foreign sweets have overtaken the Sri Lankan market. Taking into consideration these information, Imalka launched a business in selling sweets through a website, making it accessible to both local and foreign clients.

Imalka started the business initially in a small scale. She accepted orders of the local clients, made the sweets herself, and distributed them using her private vehicle.

But within a short period of time her products became popular and the number of orders also increased. Therefore, she hired some employees to help with the work while expanding the basic facilities to uplift the business. Presently, the business has grown in to a large scale and the products are also reaching foreign countries such as Qatar and Norway. As she further explained, the products also reach five star hotels and special occasions organized by the top businesses in Sri Lanka.

Imalka promoted her website only using social media. As she suggests, "internet is a highly useful place to launch a business because it does not require a lot of capital". As she further explained, "if you want to make your business popular through the internet the only thing you need is creativity and potential to try out novel ideas". An Entrepreneurial Incubator: A Dream of Aspiring Entrepreneurs

The 'barrier' to entrepreneurship is deeply rooted in our education system and values, where the former is focused on creating 'professionals' and not 'entrepreneurs'. When speaking to a group of small and medium entrepreneurs, one stated 'I want to send my child to a good school to make him a doctor or an engineer'. Thus to say 'it's extremely difficult for Sri Lankan small entrepreneurs to set up business and make it into a success' is not an exaggeration. On one hand, they have to overcome social stigma, not limited to friends and members of the community, but also from their loved ones. Let's say this challenge is somehow won over, then comes the whole challenge of finding resources, satisfying 'outdated' (as per an entrepreneur) legal requirements, and support to establish themselves firmly on their own feet. Whoever said starting a business is an easy task needs to speak to entrepreneurs to truly appreciate what hardships they have faced in setting up a business.

Many entrepreneurs highlighted the biggest challenge they had to overcome was the initial support. 'The support given by family and loved ones was low. People criticized the idea of starting a business and created rumours as to why I started a business and how it grew' said one entrepreneur. Another one reminiscing his experience stated 'I had to carry big bags of material. I did not have a vehicle and so I walked with these bags. My friends, neighbours, and even close family mem-

bers had that look of scorn. I will never forget it. I still keep the bags to remind me how I started'. These memories show just a glimpse of the hardships they encountered when they started. How wonderful it would be if a space, free of judgement, for entrepreneurs to work with all the support they need, is created!

An incubator is one such safe and nourishing space for the business 'seed' to plant and grow. An incubator will create a space free of social stigma, a place for an entrepreneur to do what needs to be done first, 'dream'. It not only provides the opportunity for an entrepreneur to obtain assistance required but also enables an entrepreneur to create local and even international networks which an entrepreneur highlighted was a challenge most of them faced.

The entrepreneurs were truly appreciative of such an initiative. In fact, some of them even now wanted to use such a space. They had so many suggestions as to the kind of facilities which would make this incubator a success. I once heard someone saying 'an incubator is an entrepreneur's dream'. I conclude with the hope that this dream becomes a reality.
